



## **PASTOR'S CORNER**





I am an idea pack rat and a thief. Whenever I find something interesting, I put it in a file marked IDE-AS and every so often I will read them to get ideas for homilies and the like. I

am not at all sure where I found this, but considering that we are in the midst of graduation season, and I have to do several bulletins all at once, AND we are at the tip of the spear of ALL THINGS NEW, I offer this for your reflection (#1 to #9 were in the bulletin last week if you missed it!).

18 things to tell 18 year olds (and 28 year olds, and 48 year olds, and 68 year olds)

**10. Always be honest with yourself and others.** – Living a life of honesty creates peace of mind, and peace of mind is priceless. Period.

11. Talk to lots of people in college and early on in your career. - Bosses. Colleagues. Professors. Classmates. Social club members. Other students outside of your major or social circle. Teaching assistants. Career advisors. College deans. Friends of friends. Everyone! Why? Professional networking. I have worked for three employers since I graduated from college (I left my first two employers by choice on good terms), but I only interviewed with the first employer. The other two employers offered me a job before I even had a formal interview, based strictly on the recommendation of a hiring manager (someone I had networked with over the years). When employers look to fill a position, the first thing they do is ask the people they know and trust if they know someone who would do well in the position. If you start building your professional network early, you'll be set. Over time, you'll continue talking to new people you meet through your current network and your network's reach and the associated opportunities will continue to snowball for the duration of your career.

**12. Sit alone in silence for at least ten minutes every day.** – Use this time to think, plan, reflect, and dream. Creative and productive thinking flourish in solitude and silence. With quiet, you can hear your thoughts, you can reach deep within yourself, and you can focus on mapping out the next logical, productive step in your life.

**13. Ask lots of questions.** – The greatest 'adventure' is the ability to inquire, to ask questions. Sometimes in the process of inquiry, the search is more significant than the answers. Answers come from other people, from the universe of knowledge and history, and from the intuition and deep wisdom inside yourself. These answers will never surface if you never ask the right questions. Thus,

the simple act of asking the right questions is the answer.

**14. Exploit the resources you do have access to.** – The average person is usually astonished when they see a physically handicap person show intense signs of emotional happiness. How could someone in such a restricted physical state be so happy? The answer rests in how they use the resources they do have. Stevie Wonder couldn't see, so he exploited his sense of hearing into a passion for music, and he now has 25 Grammy Awards to prove it.

**15. Live below your means.** – Live a comfortable life, not a wasteful one. Do not spend to impress others. Do not live life trying to fool yourself into thinking wealth is measured in material objects. Manage your money wise-ly so your money does not manage you. Always live well below your means.

**16. Be respectful of others and make them feel good.** – In life and business, it's not so much what you say that counts, it' how you make people feel. So respect your elders, minors, and everyone in between. There are no boundaries or classes that define a group of people that deserve to be respected. Treat everyone with the same level of respect you would give to your grandfather and the same level of patience you would have with your baby brother. Supporting, guiding, and making contributions to other people is one of life's greatest rewards. In order to get, you have to give.

**17. Excel at what you do.** – There's no point in doing something if you aren't going to do it right. Excel at your work and excel at your hobbies. Develop a reputation for yourself, a reputation for consistent excellence.

**18. Be who you were born to be.** – You must follow your heart, and be who you were born to be. Some of us were born to be musicians – to communicate intricate thoughts and rousing feelings with the strings of a guitar. Some of us were born to be poets – to touch people's hearts with exquisite prose. Some of us were born to be entrepreneurs – to create growth and opportunity where others saw rubbish. And still, some of us were born to be or do whatever it is, specifically, that moves you. Regardless of what you decide to do in your lifetime, you better feel it in every fiber of your being. You better be born to do it! Don't waste your life fulfilling someone else's dreams and desires.



# A group in Webster was formed during Covid called Churches Together for Justice.

It has grown and now most of the churches in Webster are involved. The active members include Webster Presbyterian, First Congregational, Peace United Church of Christ, Christ Lutheran, Emanuel Episcopal, Webster Hills Methodist, and Holy Redeemer. The North Webster churches are also involved and participate as they can. The focus of the group is social justice issues that affect our community. This past Sunday we organized a March Against Gun Violence which had about 300 people marching peacefully down Lockwood Ave expressing that they want common sense solutions to end the gun violence in our communities. Group members have traveled to Jeff City to lobby for Medicaid expansion, the end of the death penalty, more affordable housing, common sense solutions to gun violence, etc. We write our legislators and alert each other to issues of concern. We have had local leaders meet with us on zoom to educate us about these issues and what resources are available.

We meet every Wednesday on zoom with whoever wants to join us. You can join our group by email and only participate in those issues that are of concern to you or you can meet with us regularly on zoom and become very involved. It's your choice but I encourage you to join in to help us create a community that is loving and supportive to all.

## FLAG DAY - JUNE 14

## Our Stars and Stripes Speak to All of US

The American Flag is made up of 13 horizontal stripes -- seven red alternating with six white representing our original 13 Colonies. Red symbolizes hardiness and valor, white symbolizes purity and innocence, and blue represents vigilance, perseverance, and justice. The stars represent the 50 states of our Union. Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress, was commissioned to sew the first flag of the United States. The American Flag has many nicknames – The Stars and Stripes, The Red, White, and Blue, Star Spangled Banner, and Old Glory.



The flag is folded 13 times into a triangle to resemble the tri-cornered hat worn by George Washington and his Continental Army Soldiers during our War of Independence.

Each fold of the flag has meaning as it honors life, veterans, mothers, fathers, and God. When the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust." In 1946, President Harry S. Truman, from Independence Missouri, made June 14<sup>th</sup> Flag day. **So go ahead and proudly fly your American flag on that day and everyday as a celebration of the many blessings in your life.**
